## The First Lesson. The Reader begins

## A Reading from Numbers

From Mount Hor Israel set out by the way to the Red Sea, to go around the land of E'dom; and the people became impatient on the way. And the people spoke against God and against Moses, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? For there is no food and no water, and we loathe this worthless food." Then the LORD sent fiery serpents among the people, and they bit the people, so that many people of Israel died. And the people came to Moses, and said, "We have sinned, for we have spoken against the LORD and against you; pray to the LORD, that he take away the serpents from us." So Moses prayed for the people. And the LORD said to Moses, "Make a fiery serpent, and set it on a pole; and every one who is bitten, when he sees it, shall live." So Moses made a bronze serpent, and set it on a pole; and if a serpent bit any man, he would look at the bronze serpent and live. Then Israel sent messengers to Si'hon king of the Am'orites, saying, "Let me pass through your land; we will not turn aside into field or vineyard; we will not drink the water of a well; we will go by the King's Highway, until we have passed through your territory." But Si'hon would not allow Israel to pass through his territory. He gathered all his men together, and went out against Israel to the wilderness, and came to Ja'haz, and fought against Israel. And Israel slew him with the edge of the sword, and took possession of his land from the Arnon to the Jab'bok, as far as to the Am'monites; for Ja'zer was the boundary of the Am'monites. And Israel took all these cities, and Israel settled in all the cities of the

Am'orites, in Heshbon, and in all its villages. For Heshbon was the city of Si'hon the king of the Amorites, who had fought against the former king of Moab and taken all his land out of his hand, as far as the Arnon. Therefore the ballad singers say, "Come to Heshbon, let it be built, let the city of Si'hon be established. For fire went forth from Heshbon, flame from the city of Si'hon. It devoured Ar of Moab, the lords of the heights of the Arnon. Woe to you, O Moab! You are undone, O people of Che'mosh! He has made his sons fugitives, and his daughters captives, to an Am'orite king, Si'hon. So their posterity perished from Heshbon, as far as Di'bon, and we laid waste until fire spread to Med'eba." Thus Israel dwelt in the land of the Am'orites. And Moses sent to spy out Ja'zer; and they took its villages, and dispossessed the Amorites that were there. Then they turned and went up by the way to Ba'shan; and Og the king of Ba'shan came out against them, he and all his people, to battle at Ed're-i. But the LORD said to Moses, "Do not fear him; for I have given him into your hand, and all his people, and his land; and you shall do to him as you did to Si'hon king of the Amorites, who dwelt at Heshbon." So they slew him, and his sons, and all his

people, until there was not one survivor left to him; and they possessed his land.

#### The Second Lesson. The Reader begins

A Reading from the Gospel according to Matthew And when Jesus entered the temple, the chief priests and the elders of the people came up to him as he was teaching, and said, "By what authority are you doing these things, and who gave you this authority?" Jesus answered them, "I also will ask you a question; and if you tell me the answer, then I also will tell you by what authority I do these things. The baptism of John, whence was it? From heaven or from men?" And they argued with one another, "If we say, 'From heaven,' he will say to us, 'Why then did you not believe him?' But if we say, 'From men,' we are afraid of the multitude; for all hold that John was a prophet." So they answered Jesus, "We do not know." And he said to them, "Neither will I tell you by what authority I do these things. What do you think? A man had two sons; and he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' And he answered, 'I will not'; but afterward he repented and went. And he went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir,'

but did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly, I say to you, the tax collectors and the harlots go into the kingdom of God before you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness, and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the harlots believed him; and even when you saw it, you did not afterward repent and believe him."
